A Personal Service Perspective

My name is Jack and I am an addict. I am by no means an expert on service work. This is my own perspective as I see it as a member of our fellowship. With just a little over 20 months clean many would still view me as a newcomer. I still have a long road in recovery. But I took up service work the minute I walked in the door as a coffee maker and a greeter.

Service work is not a requirement. The only requirement for membership in our program is a desire to stop using, period. Anything beyond that is all suggestions given by our founders and our predecessors. Many of them have said that this is an action not a talking program.

We all have our opinions good or bad. But until we step up and take some responsibility that is all they are. There are many people in our program who step up unselfishly and willingly into service work. They do it for their own recovery and to reach out to other addicts. And they do it to the best of their ability. Is it always the right way, No! Is it always the wrong way, No! But they have stepped up and have tried to the best of their abilities.

I have served as a coffee maker, greeter, GSR, secretary, treasurer and serve on the PI and Newsletter committees. I have not always done it the right way. But when given direction I always took it.

There are always opinions as to whether our fellowship and those in it are doing the right or wrong thing. The best thing to do if we don't agree with what is going on is to step up to service work, offer our input honestly, openly, and open mindedly and try to make a difference. This is a we program. If WE all work together for the common good we can make it a brighter, smoother more attractive fellowship.

Area News

In last few months there have been discussions on how to create a healthy reserve for Area. Plainly put, we are going broke. With this in mind there was a motion brought forth: The Anchorage Area cease all spending with the exception of the Help Line, meeting schedule printing and storage unit, until such time that there is a prudent reserve in the Anchorage Area bank account that is equal to three months average expenditures. This motion PASSED at the April NA Area Service Committee Meeting.

What this means: No money is being given to subcommittees (Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information, Activities, Newsletter and Literature) until Area has enough money in reserve. There was an Adhoc Meeting on April 19th to discuss what the exact budget requirements are needed for Area and where we can save money. More will be revealed...

<u>How can you help</u>? On May 21st there is a function **solely** to assist in getting funds to Area and to promote the unity of our fellowship. See page 1 for details! This is a WE program, lets make our Area viable to carry the message to the addict who still suffers. Mark your calendars! Hope to see you there!

Second Concept

The final responsibility and authority for NA services rests with the NA groups.

The NA service structure has been created by the groups to serve the common needs of the groups. Our fellowship's service boards and committees exist to help groups share their experience with one another, provide tools which help groups function better, attract new members to group recovery meetings, and carry the NA message further than any single group could carry it alone. Because the groups have created the service structure, they have final authority over all its affairs. By the same token, the groups also have the final responsibility for the support of all its activities. The two go hand in hand.
