THE HAT I WEAR~


When I first came to NA. I did not really understand much about anonymity. I thought it just meant that everything was very, very secret. You know, it is said at every meeting, "What you hear here, who you see here, let it stay here." I have learned a lot in my years of attendance.

My lessons started with a brother who acted like he did not know me at meetings. At first, this hurt my feelings. I thought he was ashamed of me. It turned out he was protecting my anonymity by letting me be just another addict instead of "that one addict's little sister".

The next lesson came when I entered the professional world. People would come in to my place of employment, as consumers, then try to talk to me about services when we were at a meeting. This took away some of my ability to focus on what I was at the meeting for in the first place—my recovery. It also made it difficult to keep what was said to me at a meeting separate from staffing at work. The lines sometimes blurred to the point of affecting my serenity. It was often hard to separate it out and set boundaries with people that would ensure both their anonymity and mine.

Today, my definition of anonymity means, when I am at a meeting you and I are both addicts. You are not a lawyer, a grocer or a butcher at that point. I will not call you on your personal number to come and fix my plumbing and I will not ask you at a meeting if you have my taxes done. "Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions." I love that portion of the twelfth tradition. I believe it is the most important ten words in our literature on how to conduct our lives and our relationships with other people. To me it says that we all wear different hats at different times. It says that the hat I wear in NA is very different from the hat I wear anywhere else. If I honor that for myself, and for others, I will always weigh in on principles instead of engaging in popularity contests or manipulations to get what I want. It means I learn to let go of control and learn to listen to every other person with an open mind and willingness. I step out of the triangle of selfobsession. I am just another NA hat, searching for unity.

WE SAT ALONE

While in treatment I was asked what I was going to do for my recovery program when I got back to Seward. My reply was, "Since there are no NA meetings there, I will start one." And I did just that.

When I returned to Seward I contacted the Pastor of a local church. The kind folks at the Church of the Nazarene gave me the opportunity to have an NA meeting there one night a week.

I contacted NA World Services and they led me through the process of getting the meeting started. I had to pick a name and register the group so we were official. I picked "Toys In The Addict," from the name of a song (but of course changed the last word to "addict"). I thought the name fit well for a couple of reasons. First of all, I believe the members of the band have visited our rooms many times. Second, my addiction sometimes plays, as if it were a toy inside the attic of my head.

The first 3 months it was just three of us. Myself and two other local fellas. It wasn't soon after that one member got a job out of town and

moved away, and the other member went back out to his addiction. I was flying solo for many monthsattending every meeting, setting up, opening with our readings, etc. The questions that kept coming to my selfish, self-seeking mind were, "Can I continue to hold on to this meeting? Is it worth my time if I'm the only person that ever shows up? What good is it anyway?". RED FLAG!!! I caught myself and replied, "Dano thinks he is 'better than' and has more important things to do, bla bla bla!" Yes, my addiction raised it's ugly head many times while I was sitting there. Thanks to my Higher Power my mind would get grounded long enough for me to get my spiritual senses back.

I'm glad this time around I got beat down enough to surrender to the fact that my recovery from active addiction HAS to be my number one priority. I told myself that if nothing else, it would give me time to do my step work and read the literature—so the meeting must go on.

Then one day (God's time, not mine) I came to the meeting to open up and there was this young fella standing at the door waiting to get in. Greeting him, I asked if he was there for the NA meeting. He told me he was, and that he would like to come in and see what it was all about—it was his first meeting.

After we shook hands and exchanged names I asked him to help set up. After some small talk we worked our way around to starting the official meeting. I totally respect the principles of a structured meeting—the message of recovery is a life or death ordeal for us, but that day the priority was to help the newcomer feel comfortable and accepted. He stated his name and that he was an addict before starting the first reading. "Okay", I thought, "He qualified himself—I like that".

And so it was him and I, a meeting of two. At that moment, the meeting had doubled in size. The crazy addiction that creeps inside my head, the one that asks questions like, "What am I doing here by myself?!" finally had to take a back seat. Calm came over me and I realized that it was not about me, in fact it was about the newcomer. It was about the fact that when I came around the rooms were opened for me by men and women who gave freely of themselves.

As time went on and folks came and went from our small meeting here in Seward, and at the core of the group it was still the two of us. As the saying goes, "Nothing is constant but change". The young man finished his welding program. Yep, he was working the steps, going to meetings, and calling his sponsor and a real strange thing happened to him. He was ASKED to go up to the slope to work. I know, right?!

So there I was, again, this time it felt different, much different. It felt like I would be okay sitting in the rooms by myself. By this time I was reaching out more to the NA fellowship in Kenai. I started to call in to the monthly Area meeting & on some occasions I even drove to Kenai so I could attend in person. The lines of communication started to open up. I got to know more people, got men's cell phone numbers, and got connected to the local NA social media.

One day I saw a post online that the Kenai Activities Committee had created a "Road Trip to Seward" event to give our group some support. Just seeing the post gave me a chill. "Like someone would really come all the way over here

to see us" -Damn voices!!!

I have lived in Alaska since I was 8, and you can't get more than five people together to do anything. I mean, the intentions are usually admirable, but someone always has something else going on. In my experience, if five people say they're going to do something and only three show up, it's a good day. In other words, I only expected 5-10 people at most.

It also turned out that the young man I mentioned earlier had reached a year clean and would be home to celebrate with us that day! This was looking to be a good meeting and I was excited for the day to come.

I had to be in Anchorage the day of that meeting and I started to get concerned that I was going to miss it...but my HP had a different plan for me.

I got back to town just in time. When I rolled in to the parking lot there was a caravan of vehicles waiting for me to open up. Holy Crap!!! There were 5 vehicles and 23 members, with kids and dogs in tow. I hardly knew how to contain myself! I was brimming with excitement and joy!

The meeting was on gratitude, I was fortunate enough to be able to give the chairperson his One Year keychain. One of the visiting members even went out and picked up a cake so we could celebrate in style.

Looking around that room, a huge wealth of gratitude rushed through me and I understood what it meant when we read of, "the therapeutic value of one addict helping another".

We ended the meeting with the 3rd Step Prayer and massive hugs by all. We chatted for a spell in the room, then migrated outside for our goodbye and group photo. After everyone had pulled away and I finished the chores I sat down for a moment to reflect. I realized what a great family I have and most importantly, even when I'm in the rooms of NA and I'm the only one there, <u>We</u> sat alone.

TRADITION ONE

"Anonymity, the spiritual foundation of our tradition, supports NA unity as well. When we apply anonymity to the First Tradition, we overlook the differences that would separate us. In the context of unity, anonymity means the message of recovery is for every addict who wants it. We learn to set aside our prejudices and focus on our common identity as addicts. Each of us has an equal right to and responsibility for the wellbeing of Narcotics Anonymous."

STEP ONE

"The process of recovery isn't easy. It takes great courage and perseverance to continue in recovery day after day. Part of the recovery process is to move forward in spite of whatever may stand in our way. Because long-lasting change in recovery happens slowly, we will turn to the first step again and again. Even long periods of abstinence do not guarantee us continued freedom from the pain and trouble that addiction can bring. The symptoms of our disease can always return. We may find we are powerless in ways we never imaged. This is where we begin to understand how the things we tried so hard to control are, in reality, completely beyond our control. No matter how our disease displays itself, we must take its deadly nature into account. As we do, we develop a fuller awareness of the nature of our disease."

"The feeling of love and acceptance we find in the Fellowship of Narcotics Anonymous allows us to begin recovering from our addiction. We learn a new way to live. The emptiness from which we suffered is filled through working and living the Twelve Steps. We learn that our addiction is being addressed in all its complexity by this simple program. We have found a solution to our hopelessness."

Leaving a facility in a loud and disrespectful

manner, or fighting at NA events, can harm NA's reputation. We have choices about the impression we leave on those around us. Our actions tend to serve as our strongest public relations message."

Conference Agenda Report The report contains reports, proposals, and motions from the World Board and any proposals submitted from regions, for consideration by NA groups. It is the primary resource for the Old Business session of the **World Service Conference** (WSC). The report contains motions for groups to vote on that are relevant to the groups. Basically: Motions and Proposals of old business that need to be voted

Conference Approval Track The report contains a variety of information, including the NAWS strategic planning and proposed projects for the upcoming cycle. Having a separate approval track from the CAR allows for materials intended for committees and boards, such as handbooks or service manuals, to be distributed directly to conference participants 90 days before the WSC, allowing time for the regional delegates to workshop it in a manner that fits within their local community.

The WSC meets every two years. Basically: Motions and proposals are the CAR; NAWS Strategic Plan, projects, service materials and NAWS budget is the CAT.

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
